Caring for Your Pet's Teeth

If you have a dog or a cat, you probably work hard to keep your pet healthy. You might take your pet for walks and bring it to the veterinarian for checkups. You give your pet fresh water and nutritious food. But do you take care of your pet's teeth? If you don't, your dog or cat can end up with tooth decay, cavities, and bad breath!

Here's how to keep your pet's teeth clean:

- 1. Have your vet check your pet's teeth. Your dog or cat could already have tooth decay or gum disease. If so, your pet might be in pain. The vet can take care of any big problems before you start cleaning your pet's teeth.
- 2. With an adult's help, look into your dog's or cat's mouth often so the animal will get used

to it. Reward your pet with a treat or praise.

- 3. Buy a pet toothbrush and toothpaste at a pet supply store.
- 4. Put your dog or cat on a couch or other comfortable spot to brush its teeth. If you have a cat, try gently wrapping your pet in a towel to keep it still.
- 5. With an adult's help, use the toothbrush and paste to brush your pet's teeth. Be gentle. You do not want to scare or hurt your pet.
- 6. Give your pet a treat after the cleaning.

 Chewing on hard treats can scrape plaque off of its teeth. Plaque is the sticky material that causes tooth decay.
- 7. Have your pet's teeth checked by a vet once a year.


